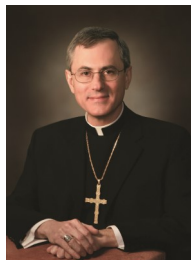

World Day of the Sick-February 11th

"You received without payment; give without payment" (Mt 10:8)

"Life is a gift from God. Amid today's culture of waste and indifference, I would point out that "gift" is the category best suited to challenging today's individualism and social fragmentation, while at the same time promoting new relationships and means of cooperation between peoples and cultures. Dialogue – the premise of gift – creates possibilities for human growth and development capable of breaking through established ways of exercising power in society. "Gift" means more than simply giving presents: it involves the giving of oneself, and not simply a transfer of property or objects. "Gift" differs from gift-giving because it entails the free gift of self and the desire to build a relationship. It is the acknowledgement of others, which is the basis of society. "Gift" is a reflection of God's love, which culminates in the incarnation of the Son and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

Generosity inspires and sustains the work of the many volunteers who are so important in health care and who eloquently embody the spirituality of the Good Samaritan. One particular area in which your presence expresses the Church's care and concern is that of advocacy for the rights of the sick, especially those affected by pathologies requiring special assistance. Your volunteer work in medical facilities and in homes, which ranges from providing health care to offering spiritual support, is of primary importance. Countless persons who are ill, alone, elderly or frail in mind or body benefit from these services. I urge you to continue to be a sign of the Church's presence in a secularized world. Volunteer work passes on values, behaviours and ways of living born of a deep desire to be generous. It is also a means of making health care more humane.

A spirit of generosity ought especially to inspire Catholic healthcare institutions, whether in the more developed or the poorer areas of our world, since they carry out their activity in the light of the Gospel. Catholic facilities are called to give an example of self-giving, generosity and solidarity in response to the mentality of profit at any price, of giving for the sake of getting, and of exploitation over concern for people.

I urge everyone, at every level, to promote the culture of generosity and of gift, which is indispensable for overcoming the culture of profit and waste. Catholic healthcare institutions must not fall into the trap of simply running a business; they must be concerned with personal care more than profit. We know that health is relational, dependent on interaction with others, and requiring trust, friendship and solidarity. It is a treasure that can be enjoyed fully only when it is shared. The joy of generous giving is a barometer of the health of a Christian."

World Marriage Day - Sunday February 10th:

This weekend we celebrate World Marriage Day! The permanent theme for World Marriage Day is: "Love One Another" from the commandment given by us in John chapter 14. This gospel gives us a simple but challenging message of how our Heavenly Father wishes us to live. Loving one another is a daily decision - simple, but challenging. Let's take time to pray for all who are called to the vocation of the sacrament of marriage.

Last Friday was a day set aside to pray for victims of human trafficking. Human trafficking involves the recruitment, transportation, harbouring and/or exercising control, direction or influence over the movements of a person in order to exploit that person, typically through sexual exploitation or forced labour. It is often described as a modern form of slavery. At any given time, it is estimated 2.45 million people are being trafficked. We know all human beings are created in God's likeness and image. We are all his precious and loved children. We pray for awareness and understanding of the destruction and devastation of human trafficking and ask that God's Spirit fill our hearts with compassion for not only those who we can see, but also for those we are unable to see and for those who are locked in the darkness of present day slavery and bondage of human trafficking.

This past week our readings at Mass have called us to consider our missionary spirit. Too often we think that missionaries are special people chosen by God to preach the gospel in foreign lands. That is true. Some disciples of Jesus do receive such a call and are by definition missionaries. However, whether the mission area involves our home, parish school, workplace or social setting the same invitation is to proclaim a complete and radical re-orientation of our lives in the direction of Jesus. This is the way we all preach the kingdom of God to others.

How we do that is extremely important and one of the ways Jesus calls us to do it is – together. That's why he sent his followers out in pairs. Working collaboratively is essential to successful ministry in the church. Often we are tempted to simply want to do everything by ourselves as it appears easier - but that's not what we are called to do. When we let that happen, there may be some new and creative ideas that come forward but unfortunately egos and rugged individualism get in the way. Working together with others allows us to experience dependence on other people, hospitality, sharing faith, and healing which requires people to encounter one another. Humility, simplicity, reconciliation and love must be practiced and not only preached. That just might be the key message. How we get along is also the message to others. That's what people see and remember.

Monday, February 11th is the World Day of the Sick. The minister of Jesus to the sick is central to the life of the Church. We don't neglect those who are sick and we recognize the effort of medical personnel, pastoral care workers and institutions that are present to restore health to those who are ill.

"Pope Francis frequently highlights our need for showing joy as one of the major marks of being Christian, and it is not surprising that he points towards the joyful possibilities that can be experienced even in times of sickness and ill health. He tells us that the development of the relationship of solidarity between sick people and their helpers can be a means to this joy. It is a gift we can give to each other to counter the seeming despair of the world in the face of suffering and our capacity to handle it. " (Moira McQueen)
